Where is the company based? It is concerning if they are in a different state or country.

Confirm if any switchboard work needs to be done prior to installation and if that is a service the company quoting can provide.

Don't pay more than 10% deposit.



Check panels on installation day and compare them to panels listed in quote.

Site inspection before installation day. Not a friendly on-site chat but measuring your roof and making sure everything fits as well as planning the installation and going through it with you.



Discuss inverter location. If in direct sunlight, ask for a shade cover.

System warranties. How long? Opt for a whole system warranty if possible. You are entitled to a 5-year workmanship warranty which is different from a whole system one (Home Building Act).



Connecting your solar system to WiFi and setting up the solar app on your phone.

Don't fall for accredited Installers, Retailers, Designers, or New Energy Tech Approved Sellers logos. This is not a measure of quality, especially when you don't follow the guidelines. We do advise using the New Energy Tech Consumer Code contract of sales.



Any terms that give the installer the right to switch panels/products to something "similar".

Prior to paying your deposit ensure that the terms and conditions include returning your deposit in case of disagreement on project variations.

Meet the person who quoted you.



Spare roof tiles if your roof is a tile roof. Who sources them?

Living close to salt water, ask for salt-resistant panels and if a panel warranty is still applicable. Jinko, REC and Sunpower would be the go-to.



If the total price of the job is more than \$20,000, ask for home insurance proof (Consumer Act 2010).

Having in-house installers isn't always a good thing. If your in-house install quality is subpar, then that's what you get on all your jobs.



Post-installation service and process.

If the company is subcontracting, ask about the process and if they'll divulge the installer details before commencing the work and if you can speak/meet the installer before the installation too.
